| Name of Applicant  | Award Granted | Project Summary   |

| Capitol Dental Care  | \$85,000.00   | Capitol Dental Care received funding for their <i>Tooth Fairy Deliveries</i> project which was developed to provide free oral health kits (toothbrushes and fluoride toothpaste) to any child age 0-14 in Marion Polk counties. In addition, this project will engage children and families served by their CDC Outreach program which has been limited by COVID- 19 restrictions in schools, Head Start programs and Marion County WIC program.  |
| Catholic Community Services of the Mid-Willamette Valley and Central Coast | \$202,500.00  | The <i>Building Community Resilience in Affordable Housing</i> initiatives address the social determinants of health and health equity to improve resident health outcomes in CCS' and partners' affordable housing complexes. The initiative follows the five Strengthening Families Protective Factors including Parental Resilience, Social Connections, Concrete Support in Times of Need, Knowledge of Parenting and Child Development, and Social and Emotional Competence of Children. |
| HIV Alliance   | \$25,000.00   | The HIV Alliance received funding for their syringe exchange and opioid response program in Marion County. Specifically, funding from the Willamette Health Council provides program supplies (e.g., syringes and safer injection supplies, supplies for naloxone kits, fentanyl test strips) and supports staff FTE.   |
| Iron Tribe Network   | \$68,000.00   | Funding supports the startup costs of two sober group houses as well as a half-time Peer Support Specialist position for the houses. These homes will be low-barrier and low-rent for folks who typically struggle to be approved for affordable housing in Marion-Polk Counties due to incarceration, substance use, behavioral health challenges, eviction and/or bad credit; they will be available to both individuals and families.  |
| Mano a Mano  | \$100,000.00  | The <i>Polk County Family Wellness Project</i> (Proyecto Bienestar Familiar de Polk County) enables Mano a Mano to implement a culturally specific response to help reduce toxic stress among Latino/a/x families in Independence and rural Polk County. This project builds on Mano a Mano's current outreach and resource navigation work in that region.   |
| Marion County Health and Human Services                                    | \$200,000.00  | Marion County HHS received funding to implement the PAX Good Behavior Game, as a complement to their Mental Health Promotion Program activities. The PAX GBG creates change in behavior that increase self-regulation and improves social-emotional well-being. Implementation of the GBG has shown positive long-term outcomes for both mental health and substance abuse, which relate directly to Marion County's current CHIP target priority issues.                                     |
| Northwest Senior and Disability Services (NWSDS)                           | \$75,000.00   | The <i>H.O.P.E.</i> (Healthy Opportunities for Personal Empowerment) <i>Senior Peer Mentor Program</i> assists seniors and younger disabled individuals to address mild to moderate depression with the use of a cognitive therapy-based workbook model. Concurrently, each participant is paired with a trained and supervised volunteer mentor.   |
| Recovery Outreach Community Center   | \$153,892.00  | ROCC received funding for their Drop-In Center Programs in Salem and Mill City throughout 2021. These are programs that maintain a free, low-barrier safe space where safety, comfort, and a sense of community are present at all times for people in recovery from addiction or facing challenges with mental health, trauma, and/or housing. It has emotional support programs, peer-led groups, 1-on-1 peer support, resource navigation, and other activities.                           |
